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History of the Freddy Fixer Parade

In September 1962, a Clean-up Campaign was started in the Dixwell-Newhallville community initiated by the late Dr. Fred Smith, a respected physician in the Dixwell area, which culminated in the parade organized with assistance of Edward Grant, Edna Baker Carnegie, and Dr. Charles Twyman.

The 1st parade was held on May, 18, 1963 with 7,000 onlookers. By 1972, the parade

drew 20,000 people and its grand marshal was Jackie Robinson. Today, Freddy Fixer Parade is nationally recognized as the oldest Black American Parade in the northeast.

In December 2015, a group of civic-minded community members set out to revitalize the Freddy Fixer Parade through their membership in a newly incorporated committee: The Elm City Freddy Fixer Parade Committee, Inc. ECFFPC members have already made great strides in restoring the parade's glory and set into motion an infectious exuberance that permeated throughout the Greater New Haven community. This energy that residents, organizers and supporters, alike, have brought to this campaign has been contagious and has resulted in an amazing amount of good will. The committee was not only successful in meeting all financial obligations associated with the 2016-2018 parades, but also attracted 64 diverse marching units or approximately 650 participants. Similarly, spectators along the parade route were estimated to number some 7,000 individuals.

Accordingly, it is incumbent upon us to keep up this momentum of rejuvenated pride in our cultural heritage; and to never, again, neglect to pay homage to our predecessors' vision of collective solidarity toward the common goal of neighborhood beautification that culminates into a yearly celebration through the Elm City Freddy Fixer Parade. Securing our own legacy through this consistent, constructive and harmonious display of our cultural norms, values and ethics will be the impetus that conveys the story of our history we want told for many generations to come.





Robyn Porter Connecticut State Representative

Edna Baker Carnegie Award

Since winning the 94th Assembly District seat, State Rep. Robyn Porter has championed efforts to reform Connecticut's criminal justice system, strengthen equal rights and increase protections for domestic violence victims.

Porter was first elected to the Connecticut House of Representatives in April 2014 after a special election.

As chairwoman of the Labor & Public Employees Committee, Porter has advocated for legislation that would increase the state's minimum wage and establish a paid family medical leave system. In 2017, at the state level, Porter continued her efforts to support working families by leading House passage of a bill that would have strengthened gender pay equity legislation on the books since 1963.

During the 2017 regular legislative session, Porter led passage of House Bill 6668 which amends Connecticut statute to strengthen current protections for pregnant women.

In addition to serving as chairwoman of the labor committee, Porter also serves as a member of the Judiciary and Appropriations committees. As a member of the Judiciary Committee, Porter supported legislation that prohibits a judge from setting bail for those charged with misdemeanors and outlaws the solitary confinement of minors.

Porter, who graduated with an A.S. from Gateway Community College, later went on to obtain her B.A. in Criminal Justice from Charter Oak State College. Both degrees were completed with high honors. She also was inducted into the Phi Theta Kappa International and the Alpha Sigma Lambda National Honor societies.

Porter, who was employed by the Communication Workers of America from 2001 to 2017, is a longtime community activist who served as co-chairwoman of the Steering Committee for the Newhallville Community Resilience Team (NCRT). During her tenure at NCRT, the committee focused on increasing public safety by building social cohesion.

Porter is the proud parent of two adult children and grandparent to three grandchildren – Amir, Alana and Zavion. She has been a New Haven, Connecticut resident since 2000.





Juan Castillo Chasing a Dream at WYBC

Edward Grant Award

Juan Castillo's journey began in Brooklyn, N.Y. He was a starting point guard basketball player at the famous Boys High School in Brooklyn from 1966

to 1969. Juan participated in two New York City championships and one national championship with only one loss in three years. He subsequently began a career in public service as a drug counselor with Narco, Inc., after serving five years in jail on drug related charges. He eventually became Executive Director of the Liberation Halfway House for ex-offenders.

Juan established the first amateur Jai-Alai facility in Milford, CT and is credited with training American players in the sport of Jai Alai and establishing the first amateur American Jai-Alai team to represent the United States in international competition. Through his efforts, American Jai-Alai players have been elevated to the status of professional athletes throughout the world.

In 1980, Juan returned to public service and worked for the Board of Parole for 20 years as a parole officer and Regional Director of the Bridgeport and New London field offices. He became the 1st ex-offender to be hired as a parole officer. During his tenure, Juan established the Parole Works Program that provided employment and training opportunities to parolees. As a result, unemployment rates among parolees were reduced from 73% to 10% and parolees were mandated to perform volunteer services while seeking employment. Juan is credited with helping hundreds of parolees regain their place in society.

Juan has spent the last 25 years at WYBC Radio as a radio announcer and is currently the station's Director of Operations' PM Drive on air personality and host of Electric Drum, a public affairs program. His perspective on the role of radio is rooted in his belief that if you provide listeners with good music and great personalities that connect with the community, listeners will remain loyal. Juan also credits the station's commitment to public service and community involvement for its success.

Juan is remarkably a colon cancer survivor. He has used the airwaves to promote early cancer testing and detection through such promotions as, *Take a Love one to the Doctor Day*. Juan continues to support organizations that are committed to cancer research and patient support. He is a Hamden resident who continues to work with local youth and returning citizens who require assistance with the re-entry process. Juan Castillo has truly carved out a legacy in New Haven and throughout the State of Connecticut. Congrats to all recipients awarded at the Elm City Freddy Fixer Gala!

designations to his Funeral Directors License including a Certified Funeral Service Practitioner (CFSP) through the Academy of Professional Funeral Service Practice, a Certified Preplanning Consultant (CPC) and a Certified Crematory Operator (CCO), both through the National Funeral Directors Association (NFDA). The overall well being of his community is front and center in his business most noticeable through the Zola Program offered to all clients of Howard K. Hill Funeral Services. Because the loss of a loved one can be a catastrophic experience, it is Howard's ambition to do as much as he can to ensure his community heals from this unavoidable life event.

He served four terms on the Executive Committee of the CFDA and as the association's Vice President. The annual award program recognizes funeral homes that hold to consistent strict ethical and professional standards and provide outstanding service to families and communities.

Howard also serves on the boards of the Community Action Agency of New Haven, Hannah Gray Home in New Haven, and Hartford Communities That Care. As a former Board member of The Community Foundation for Greater New Haven, a philanthropic institution that uses the power of endowment to transform communities, Howard developed a burning desire to help lift his community by establishing a community foundation that focuses on positively transforming Connecticut's African American community in the areas of education, economics and health. The Prosperity Foundation's (TPF) mission is to be the permanent institution that gathers community to yield better outcomes for future generations. He is a member of the Economic Committee of the Greater New Haven branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), and The Beloved Community (TBC) in New Haven. Howard also is a member of the Greater New Haven Chamber of Commerce, the Greater New Haven Business & Professional Association, and Oriental Lodge No. 6, F&AM, PH in New Haven.

Howard is married to his wife Nancy and has three children, Matthew, Kendra and Deshaun.

In May 2016, Jacqueline, affectionately known as Jackie, was appointed to the position of District Manager for the Dixwell Neighborhood Community until July 2017. Currently, she is the Assistant Deputy Patrol Commander for the New Haven Police Department. During her career, Jackie has held several positions within the police

department ranging from Firearms Compliance Officer to Training Officer at the New Haven Police Academy. She is also one of the original founding members of the New Haven Guardians, a fraternity for Black Law Enforcement Officers and has previously served as Treasurer.

Jackie earned her Master's Degree in Criminal Justice from the University of New Haven and is a Police Officer Standards and Training Council (P.O.S.T.) certified Human Trafficking Instructor and teaches Human Trafficking courses throughout Connecticut. In 2015, she became a Level One Certified Kingian Non Violence Instructor and is currently the Housing Liaison for the City of New Haven Housing Authority's and New Haven Police Department's Officer in Residence Program.

An active member since 1994, Jackie serves as Senior Financial Officer at Christian Love Center Church. She has also been an energetic member and supporter of the Elm City Freddy Fixer Parade Committee since 2015.

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The Flaming Knights Motorcycle Club (FKMC) was founded on 110 Hurlburt Street in the City of New Haven on April 27, 1968 by a group of seven friends that enjoyed the comradery while riding together on their motorcycles. Hence, the founding members, Charles Bradley (a.k.a., Big Chaz), Jesse Agnew (a.k.a., Sir Sexx), Zack Franklin, Fletcher, Wine, Ringo and Leroy Bolden (a.k.a., King Dragon), started a club with the idea to ride their motorcycles wherever there was a road to be ridden.

Locally, the FKMC organization was all about the communities in which each resided. The club traditionally presented holiday parties geared toward the youth; creating safe havens in each neighborhood. Additionally, FKMC donates to many food banks, coat drives and is popularly linked to the Freddy Fixer Parade with an impressive display of riders in each parade and in parades for years to come.

Today, FKMC is still very much a part of the community, active in food & coat drives, and mentorship of young men that need guidance in life, school, and with issues presented at home. We still ride our motorcycles all over the country, especially since recognition as a national organization; with chapters out west as far as California, up and down the east coast, and as far south as Miami, Florida.

FKMC continues to participate in the annual Freddy Fixer Parade. FKMC's mission has always been community based, brotherhood and exposing the passion for riding our motorcycles near and far. FKMC is a big part of New Haven, particularly in the Hill neighborhood, because that's where it all began on Hulburt Street. However, FKMC claims all of New Haven.

On April 27, 2018, the FKMC will have been in existence for 50 years, and we are going to celebrate our 50th anniversary on June 1-2, 2018. "FKMC is New Haven and New Haven is the FKMC." Be on the lookout for venue information in the near future.

On behalf of the FKMC, I would like to thank the Freddy Fixer Committee for this prestigious award and opportunity to reintroduce the Flaming Knights Motorcycle Club 50 years later.

In 2017, the Stetson Branch of the New Haven Free Public Library celebrated 100 years of providing library services and programming to the Newhallville and Dixwell neighborhoods. In 2003, Stetson became the hub of the Dixwell neighborhood upon the closing of the Dixwell Community House. In 2006, Diane Brown was assigned the position of Branch Manager.

As a team, Diane and her staff have catapulted the branch to local and national recognition for developing programming, services and an extensive African American collection to serve the African American community at large. The branch's success is due in part to the staff who have created and maintain a "work family" environment that extends to the community. The staff and community are looking forward to the "New Stetson" to be constructed as an anchor to the new Dixwell Community House slated to open in early 2020.





Donald Morris Pastor

Larry T. Young Award

Donald Morris is a native of the New Haven community. He attended New Haven Public Schools as a youth. He later completed high school in Litchfield, CT, while holding residency at the CT Junior Republic. In 1972 and 1980,

respectively, Pastor Morris received an Associate Degree in Sociology from Middlesex Community College and a Bachelor Degree in Human Services & Community Organizing from New Hampshire College.

Through the 1970's – 1980's, Donald founded *Unity in the Community, Brothers Getting Busy*, and *Christian Community Commission, Inc.* (nonprofit created as an educational link between local churches and the New Haven urban community). Under his leadership, the Christian Community Commission was responsible for the renovation of Goffe Street Park. Additionally, Pastor Morris has led Prayer Walks, Community Forums, various boycotts, and anti-violence marches across the State.

In 1993, Donald became a member of Wayfaring Ministries, Hamden, CT. Under Apostle Eugene Brunson's ministry, Donald became a licensed minister (1999) and was later ordained Pastor of his own church, Life Kingdom Outreach Ministries (2010).

In 2005, Pastor Morris organized the *Brotherhood Leadership Summit* to address gun violence in the City of New Haven. The Summit brought together men of all professions to address Black male leadership and community outreach, as well as, created a monthly Leadership Breakfast and summer long community, *We Care Tour* (Men delivered messages of self-pride, principles of fatherhood, and nonviolence on the street corners in the City of New Haven). Because of this joint effort, gun violence was significantly reduced for two consecutive years.

Inspired by God in 2010, Pastor Morris developed the *Promise Land Project*: A five-year prototype that addresses issues affecting the Newhallville community. *Project Lighten Up* is one of the initiatives born out of this project (4,000 LED lights were installed in the area).

Currently, Pastor Morris is a full-time senior Pastor of Life Kingdom Outreach Ministries and is dedicated to teaching the Word of God, and in serving those who are less fortunate within the Newhallville neighborhood.

Pastor Morris is the proud husband and father of five children and 14 grandchildren. His favorite biblical quote is from John 9:4: "As long as it is day, we must do the works of him who sent me. Night is coming, when no one can work." Over the years, he has received many awards recognizing his community commitment and statewide leadership.

She holds a Bachelor of Science degree from Southern Connecticut State University (SCSU) and a Television Production Certificate from Los Angeles City College. Most of Greater New Haven

would recognize Kim as an outstanding athlete who is an All-State Basketball Player from Hamden High School and an All New England/Final Four Point Guard for SCSU.

Upon graduating from SCSU, Kim moved to Hollywood, CA after teaching in the Bridgeport school system for two years. While in Hollywood, Kim created, SOAM (Students on a Mission); an entertainment production company for aspiring college students. After the events of 911, Kim dissolved her production company and headed back home to work on her passion, Kids TV. When Kim's mom (Pat Harris) passed away in 2005, she became co-owner of the Harris and Tucker School and put her passion on hold to help run the family business. On 9/6/16, the Harris and Tucker School became the only Nationally Accredited family owned and operated Preschool in Newhallville.

While taking classes at Gateway Community College, Kim helped to co-create *Preschool College Day*, a program that excites young minds towards learning and going to college. She also helped to build national support for youth serving agencies nationwide with *The Prevention of Underage Drinking* initiative.

In 2014, Mayor Toni Harp appointed Kim to sit on the New Haven Early Childhood Council where she continues to work towards making sure that all children have success.

Kim is an active member in her church, Mount Zion SDA Church, and believes that God does not give you dreams and passions to tease you. He has a plan but we must have faith and walk into the path that He is showing us.

In 2017, Kim became the Chair of the Newhallville Management Team and loves that she gets to work alongside community leaders in her neighborhood that have helped to mentor and inspire her. In 2018, Kim and her Management Team will be leading the charge to bring all of New Haven's Management Teams and the City of New Haven together to launch a summer initiative called, *65 Days of Affordable Summer Adventures*, which is slated for July 1-Labor Day 2018.

Dr. Charles Twyman Award


Gramen Wilson, born and raised in New Haven, CT, attended Hillhouse High School from 1978-1982. He later obtained a diploma from Hamden High School Adult Education in 1993 and received a Bachelor's in Business from Trinity College.

Gramen started his career at McDonald's in October of 1981 at the Kimberly Avenue location. He went from Customer Service Coordinator to Crew Chief in 16 weeks and was promoted to the Swing Manager Position within the same year. In 1983, Gramen was promoted to Assistant Manager at the Church Street McDonald's. He finished top rank in his McDonald's corporate classes; receiving several outstanding performance awards. In 1985, Gramen was promoted to General Manager of the Church Street location and soared as a leader in his field.

To his mentees, Gramen shares life lessons learned regarding management, missed opportunities to soar and his belief in the law of reciprocity: "Whatever you give will be given back a million-fold." He maintains that within the inner city, often fraught with obstacles, residents with "tons of endurance" continue to routinely succeed. Hence, Gramen concedes that "the race is not given to the swift or the strong, but to those that endure to the end."

In addition to his business, Gramen is a husband, father and grandfather. He has been in love for 35 years and married 31 years to Teresa. He is the father of three boys and one girl, Gramen, Geneva, Justen and Branden, and has seven grandchildren, Jaylin, Jayda, Queiara, Riley, Lyric, Calee and Lessyn.



Dexter A. Jones, Sr. was born in Atlantic City, New Jersey. Son of Ella Deloise Jones and the late Allen A. He gives of his time and services by holding Power - Venting Sessions in this barbershop for the neighborhood youth, giving them a neutral ground to come together and sit to discuss their problems, beefs and issues before they turn to a violent solution to problems; and by providing free haircuts for the homeless men and woman in the Elm City. Dexter also does a food and toy drive for families in need during the holidays.

Dexter is the CEO of Dominique Vasquez Entertainment, the founder of the Hamden High African American Alumni Association, and is very active in giving back to his community. For the past 5 years, he has been the driving force behind "Unity in the Community," which promotes friendship, brotherhood, networking and fellowship between the different neighborhoods, and most significantly, between the youth of New Haven. Dexter has also served as 1st President of the Elm City Freddy Fixer Parade Committee for parade seasons 2015-2017. Under his leadership, the parade has been revitalized and the formation of the Elm City Freddy Fixer Gala, honoring outstanding community service, was created. Dexter currently serves on the Executive Board as the Public Relations Officer.

Dexter is very proud to be one of only three- 4x Past Masters in the State of Connecticut. A member of Widows Son Lodge in March of 1995, he rose through the ranks from a Great Orator, a Strong Leader of Men, to 4x Master.
